

Christmas Eve Offering

You can still make your Christmas Eve offering to benefit the Near East School of Theology (N.E.S.T) in Lebanon Beirut. The school has roots back to 1835. It has become a lifeline for Protestant churches all around the Middle East. It is the only place in the Middle East where a women can receive theological and seminary education. N.E.S.T. welcomes women and men candidates from other Middle Eastern churches, as well as any person seeking to learn about Protestant theology and faith, irrespective of his or her religious affiliation.

The events of recent years in Lebanon have left their mark on the whole society and on every institution in the country. N.E.S.T. too was adversely affected, especially through the loss of teaching faculty and the reduction of the student body to a third of its pre-war size. Nevertheless, the School was able to keep its doors open all through the troubles and is now attempting to rebuild its student body and to reach out in new directions.
