MAGGI'S MUSINGS

During the last month, since I have been back from the sabbatical, I have heard a number of statements again and again: "We are glad you are back, we missed you. You look well rested. What did you do?"

Well, I am glad to be back. I come back strengthened in my conviction that I am called to be the pastor at Old First Presbyterian Church and feel like this is just where God wants me to be. I come back with a hunger to see how we will be God's church and follow in Jesus' way in the unique place we find ourselves, right here, at Sacramento and Van Ness.

I am indeed well rested and hope I can set and keep the healthy patterns of work, play and spiritual practices I developed during my sabbatical. If the truth be told, I will not be one of those pastors who works into their 70s and 80s - I will do just fine in retirement.

What did I do is a harder question to answer in any kind of succinct manner! I enjoyed a mixture of travel, study, play, planned time and *unplanned* time. I took a two-week preaching class at San Francisco Theological Seminary, participated in a Missional Workshop, joined a one day seminar with Dr. Barnwell of the gospel-music group *Sweet Honey in the Rock*, participated in a conference called Wild Goose (See more at www.wildgoosefestival.org.), took a class on mindfulness (on board a cruise ship!) and began a program for the Certificate in Executive Leadership offered by McCormick Seminary, Chicago. I spent time with nature on St. John, one of the U.S. Virgin Islands, and in the Pacific Northwest. I volunteered for two weeks at the Montreat Youth Conference in North Carolina. I also traveled and hiked in California and enjoyed much of what draws tourists from all over the world to our state. And I just enjoyed the heck out of San Francisco.

What great town to live in! I enjoyed friends and family and found time to renew friendships from college and seminary days. I brought a whole pile of books from the office which I meant to read and only read one. I read books on church and the faith that came from my classes or simply captured my interest. I read lots of fiction and non-fiction, just whatever struck my fancy. All in all, I had a renewing, delightful, restful, learning time during sabbatical. Thank you for the gift of this sabbatical season.

On both Sunday, November 4, and Sunday, November 11, I will be preaching from the book of Ruth. The book is often referenced at weddings: "Where you go, I will go; where you lodge, I will lodge; your people shall be my people and your God my God," –Ruth 1:16. Many people are surprised that this is said by the young widow Ruth to her similarly widowed mother-in-law Naomi, when Naomi tells Ruth to return to her own people. Linda Day said "The book of Ruth is a tightly knit gem of a story. Its dialogue is pithy and dramatic, wordplay abounds and the repetition of key words and phrases tie the story together. Themes of emptiness and fullness, food, and fertility are highlighted. The book addresses ethnic and class concerns. It is a story of women making their way in a man's world. Ultimately, the story presents a vision of an ideal society. There, characters show each other the same type of faithfulness and loyalty that God alone usually expresses."

Simply put, the book of Ruth is a rich and wonderful story *in only four short chapters!* I invite you to read through Ruth with me: Take out your pencil and mark places that surprise you, that make you want to learn more, that you want to come back to. I will have a discussion on Ruth after worship on October 28 and on November 4. Let's see how Ruth will speak to us this Fall!

In addition to Presbyterian Disaster Assistance (PDA) volunteers now on the ground, PDA is continuing to connect with presbyteries in the affected and potentially affected areas. Supplies have been inventoried, and additional teams of PDA volunteers stand ready to help in many aspects of the clean-up and long-term recovery process. Your generosity will only increase the effectiveness of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.)'s response.

YOUR PLEDGE DOLLARS AT WORK: THE INTERFAITH FOOD PANTRY

John 21:15 says, "When they had finished breakfast, Jesus said to Simon Peter, 'Simon, son of John, do you love more than these?' He said to him, 'Yes Lord, you know that I love you.' Jesus said to him, 'Feed my lambs.'"

The Interfaith Food Pantry began in 2010 as an outgrowth of Old First's running a 6-month special Food Pantry financed by a grant from the San Francisco Food Bank in 2009. The Food Bank asked Old First to continue the food pantry, which at that time had grown to over 200, as they felt there was a need for a pantry in our neighborhood. We did not feel that we had the money or volunteers to continue running a weekly pantry. Pastor Maggi, however, had seen how disappointed the people were who came to the pantry when they heard we were closing. She started looking to see what we could do, and after talking to other churches in the neighborhood, the interfaith pantry was born.

The Interfaith Food Pantry consists of five churches; Old First and Calvary Presbyterian Churches, St. Mark's Lutheran Church, St. Luke's Episcopal Church and First Unitarian Universalist Church. Each church contributes to the cost of the food and the salary of a part-time coordinator who shops at the food bank for each week's groceries, and coordinates the work of the five churches. Each church also supplies volunteers to man the food pantry on a rotating basis.

Every Saturday between 250 and 300 people come to Old First Presbyterian Church to get a bag of groceries from the Interfaith Food Pantry. A typical bag will contain potatoes, rice, onions, a variety of seasonal fruits and vegetables and a protein such as canned tuna, hot dogs, ground turkey or egg. Sometimes we have bread, milk, or canned goods. This is certainly not enough to feed a household of even two for a week, but it does make a difference in how well they will be able to eat.

If you are one of the people who has volunteered you know that over 95% of those who come to the pantry are of Asian ancestry and most of those are ethnic Chinese. There are more women than men; some bring a young child of infant with them. They are mostly in their 30's and 40's, although we now have people of all ages. We serve people from 9:00 to 10:30 in groups of 50. Everyone has a predetermined 15 minute time slot, which has made for a more even flow of guests and less stress for everyone.

If you haven't volunteered, please think about volunteering the next time there is a request for volunteers. If you cannot volunteer on a Saturday morning, remember that Old First could also use volunteers for the Monday Senior Center, the Tuesday Welcome Center or one of the two Saturday dinners hosted by Welcome. If none of these are possible, please remember to donate to the Food Bank. During the month of November, please bring canned tuna for the Food Bank barrel in the Narthex.

The Message: Bible in Our Language

The Message by Eugene Peterson is now available in at the church office or during coffee hour for \$10.00. This is a great companion to read side by side with the New Revised Standard Version. Pastor Maggi says "I use it to get the essence of a scripture or to look at the scripture in a new way. I really enjoy this version and encourage you to get started using it too." This edition is the New Testament and the Psalms.

Peterson says, "This version in a contemporary idiom keeps the language of the Message current and fresh and understandable in the same language in which we do our shopping, talk with our friends, worry about world affairs and teach our children their table manners. The goal is not a to render a word-for-word conversion of Greek into English but rather to convert the tone, rhythm, the events, the ideas into the way we actually think and speak." A limited number of copies will be available in the church.

Being Prepared for the “Big One” with New “App”

Being prepared for earthquake just got easier. A new smart phone “app” is available for receiving information about earthquakes from the Red Cross. This can be an important resource for you yourself and also allow you to help to those around you as we seek to live out God’s compassion in the City.

Features of the new app include:

- Notifications showing the epicenter, magnitude and intensity of earthquakes, as well as historical data for earthquakes in an area over the last 40 years.
- “I’m safe” messaging for users to broadcast reassurance to family and friends via social media
- Locations of open Red Cross shelters;
- Steps to create an emergency plan
- Preloaded emergency preparedness content, available when phones are offline or out of service
- Information about fires, tsunamis and other disasters that could happen in the aftermath of an earthquake
- Emergency tool kits with a flashlight, strobe light and audible alarm
- Interactive quizzes where users can earn badges and share their earthquake knowledge on social networks

Download the earthquake app for free at the Apple App Store and Google Play Store for Android by searching for American Red Cross.

THANKSGIVING DAY PROCLAMATION: ABRAHAM LINCOLN, 1863

The year that is drawing towards its close, has been filled with the blessings of fruitful fields and healthful skies. To these bounties, which are so constantly enjoyed that we are prone to forget the source from which they come, others have been added, which are of so extraordinary a nature, that they cannot fail to penetrate and soften even the heart which is habitually insensible to the ever watchful providence of Almighty God. In the midst of a civil war of unequalled magnitude and severity, which has sometimes seemed to foreign States to invite and to provoke their aggression, peace has been preserved with all nations, order has been maintained, the laws have been respected and obeyed, and harmony has prevailed everywhere except in the theatre of military conflict; while that theatre has been greatly contracted by the advancing armies and navies of the Union. Needful diversions of wealth and of strength from the fields of peaceful industry to the national defence, have not arrested the plough, the shuttle or the ship; the axe has enlarged the borders of our settlements, and the mines, as well of iron and coal as of the precious metals, have yielded even more abundantly than heretofore. Population has steadily increased, notwithstanding the waste that has been made in the camp, the siege and the battlefield; and the country, rejoicing in the consciousness of augmented strength and vigor, is permitted to expect continuance of years with large increase of freedom. No human counsel hath devised nor hath any mortal hand worked out these great things. They are the gracious gifts of the Most High God, who, while dealing with us in anger for our sins, hath nevertheless remembered mercy. It has seemed to me fit and proper that they should be solemnly, reverently and gratefully acknowledged as with one heart and one voice by the whole American People. I do therefore invite my fellow citizens in every part of the United States, and also those who are at sea and those who are sojourning in foreign lands, to set apart and observe the last Thursday of November next, as a day of Thanksgiving and Praise to our beneficent Father who dwelleth in the Heavens. And I recommend to them that while offering up the ascriptions justly due to Him for such singular deliverances and blessings, they do also, with humble penitence for our national perverseness and disobedience, commend to His tender care all those who have become widows, orphans, mourners or sufferers in the lamentable civil strife in which we are unavoidably engaged, and fervently implore the interposition of the Almighty Hand to heal the wounds of the nation and to restore it as soon as may be consistent with the Divine purposes to the full enjoyment of peace, harmony, tranquility and Union.

In testimony whereof, I have hereunto set my hand and caused the Seal of the United States to be affixed.
