## **MAGGI'S SUMMER READ 2014:**

### ***LEARNING TO WALK IN THE DARK* BY BARBARA BROWN TAYLOR**

Many of you have noticed I often quote Barbara Brown Taylor in my sermons. I first encountered her at a preaching workshop some twenty years ago and have grown to appreciate her insightful theology, beautiful writing and ability to open up a passage when I am stuck or at a loss to see how a passage of scripture connects to life in 2014.

Taylor is also a best-selling author on faith and spirituality, and on Holy Saturday, the day before Easter, she released her newest book *Learning to Walk in the Darkness*. I am reading it now and find myself savoring each chapter and wishing I had folks to talk with about it. So that is where you come in... I am inviting you to read this book with me this summer. We will have a number of copies available for a donation of \$5 to \$10. If you get the book, see it as a commitment to read it and not let it sit on the waiting-to-be read pile.

Johnathan Merritt writes,

Barbara Brown Taylor has been called a heretic by some and a prophet by others. Baylor University even named her one of the 12 most effective speakers in the English-speaking world. Her name is Barbara Brown Taylor, and she is on a mission to redeem the darkness. "Christianity has never had anything nice to say about darkness," says the 62-year-old Episcopal priest in her new book, *Learning to Walk in the Dark*. Taylor charges churches with propagating a "full solar spirituality" that "focuses on staying in the light of God around the clock." But she says the faithful need to discover a "lunar spirituality," which recognizes that humans need both darkness and the divine."

I look forward to our conversations and your ideas and leadership on how to engage the community of Old First Presbyterian Church in our summer read. **Read the book and watch for events related to the book in July and August.**

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### **PASTOR HENDERSON PART OF INTERFAITH DELEGATION TO TURKEY**

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The Pacifica Institute has invited our pastor, Maggi Henderson, to Travel to Turkey from June 10 to 22. The institute is a non-profit organization of Turkish-Americans ([www.pacificainstitutie.org](http://www.pacificainstitutie.org)), a goal of which is to promote cross-cultural awareness by encouraging dialog between various cultural, spiritual, ethic and belief traditions and by finding common ground where compassion can be restored. Maggi has been invited on this trip in her role of as chair of the Board of Directors of the San Francisco Interfaith Council. She will join six others including a doctor, a lawyer, tech workers, a retired policeman and public radio worker. They will travel to Istanbul, Izmir, Efes, Antalya, and Cappadocia staying in hotels and with local families. They will visit historical sights, meet with journalists, relief organizations, high school students and leaders of churches and mosques. Maggi says,

I am simply excited to visit this land where Christianity and the early church have such old roots and to widen my perception and awareness of the world. Old First Presbyterian's gift of time at my 25th Ordination Celebration gives me the freedom to say yes to this trip. Please keep me in your prayers as I travel.

During her absence, the Reverend Glenda Hope will lead worship on June 15 and the Reverend Keenan Kelsey will lead worship on June 22.

Similarly, early Christians celebrated the God's gift of the Holy Spirit to the church fifty days after Easter, Jesus' resurrection. This year we will celebrate Pentecost on Sunday, June 8. We will receive our Pentecost Offering, one of the annual special offerings of the Presbyterian Church (USA). This offering benefits children at risk, youth, and young adults. Watch for the bulletin insert on Sunday, June 1, and the Pentecost Offering envelope on Sunday, June 8.

Finally, the story in Acts speaks of the gift of the Holy Spirit as a mighty wind and its effect as one of fire above the faithful gathered there. This fire has inspired the use of the color for celebrating Pentecost. So on Pentecost Sunday, June 8, be sure to wear a dash of red.

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### **Children's Library Books**

The Alberto Barrios Children's Library is not only a library for children but has many books that adults/parents/teachers can read and enjoy. There are reference resources for all ages that can be used such as *Rand McNally Historical Atlas of the Holy Land; Encyclopedia of Easter, Carnival & Lent*; Biographies on *John Calvin, Anne Frank, Martin Luther, Randolph Caldecott, Helen Keller*; and Classic Fiction such as *The Chronicles of Narnia Series (7 vols), Harry Potter (the complete series), The Lord of the Ring Series (4 volumes), Aesop's Fables, Many Waters, A Wrinkle in Time, Charlotte's Web* and many others. These readings on joy, friendship, love, sacrifice and more will appeal to parents, teachers, librarians, pastors, and anyone looking for a creative way to explore timeless lessons on life and important values of Christian faith. —Priscilla Chang Yu

### **New Books**

#### **Parables**

Nouwen, Henri J. *The Return of the Prodigal Son*. A beautifully written story based upon Rembrandt's painting of *The Return of the Prodigal Son*. The author, Father Nouwen, is read today by Protestants and Catholics alike. Father Nouwen shares his deep experience with Rembrandt's painting and how we should be like the father of the two sons as we seek to live the Christian faith of God's grace, forgiveness, and love. The author was so touched by the painting that it changed his life completely. This is a beautiful reflective book for all age groups.

#### **History**

Bauer, Susan Wise. *The Story of the World. Vol. 1: Ancient Times*. This work is an excellent way of presenting history chronologically. It is written in story form and conversational style. It holds children's interest and as such helps them retain information. Families and teachers will enjoy reading this aloud to the children.

#### **Holidays, Easter**

Grimes, Nikki. *At Jerusalem's Gate, Poems of Easter*. This book offers readers insight into the most important moments in Christian history. This is a retelling of the Story of Easter in verse. The author includes an introduction to each poem, telling how and why she chose that part of the verse. The verses tell a part of a character or scene in the story. The woodcut illustrations by David Frampton are lovely,

reminding you of stained glass images. The last page includes Bible passages based on the verses. A book for all age groups.

Hartman, Sara. *Mary Magdalene's Easter Story*. This booklet tells the Easter story from Mary Magdalene's view-point (John 20:10-18). Children will follow Mary's faith all through Jesus' turmoil, trial and final victory.

Engelbrecht, Edward A. *The Easter Story. Drawn Directly from the Bible*. This Easter Story, with realistic illustrations tells the Easter story of Jesus Christ's walk to the cross, His glorious resurrection, and His victorious ascension into heaven, where He reigns as our Lord and Savior. Included in the book are prayers, questions, and discussions. The last page has the hymn "Glory Be to Jesus."

Lucado, Max. *The Easter Story for Children*. A strong account of Jesus' last days. This Easter book follows Jesus from the Last Supper to his trial, death, resurrection, ascension, and the power and coming of the Holy Spirit. Also woven into the story is Peter's denial, which teaches children that God's forgiveness is unending.

### **Biography**

Tutu, Archbishop Desmond. *Desmond and the Very Mean Word*. This is a true story of Archbishop Tutu, who was awarded the Nobel Peace Prize in 1984 for bringing equality, justice, and peace to his native country, South Africa. The story takes place when Tutu was a young boy, riding his new bike and being bullied by a group of boys. His struggle to overcome this finally came after talking to Father Trevor—the lesson he learned was forgiveness and love must come from within to those who hurt you, then this will free you from the pain you have suffered. Book for all age groups.

### **Worship**

Reed, G. L. *What is Baptism? and What is Communion?* The author, G.L. Reed is an educator, consultant, and mentor with twenty-five years of experience working in the fields of community building, spirituality and organizational learning. Dr. Reed holds a Doctor of Ministry in Spirituality, Sustainability, and Inter-Religious Dialogue.

These two booklets introduce the principle elements of worship for ages 9 to 12. By working through the fun activities, puzzles, and games in these multi-topic booklets series, pre-teens will learn the basic fundamentals of Christian worship, including Communion and Baptism. The size fits nicely into a Bible.

### **Bible**

Hanft, Josh. *Miracles of the Bible*. The stories of the Old Testament are told in flowing language. Hanft retells a dozen Old Testament miraculous stories, such as Eve being created from Adam's rib, the parting of the Red Sea, Noah and the Ark, David and Goliath, Daniel in the Lion's Den, and many others. Each story is told in one page, with a short, relevant Bible verse highlighted in the center of the page. Seymour Chwast's illustrations are simple but appealing. The winning features are the foldout pages of eight of the stories. Each full-page flap reveals a new central character—a hugely tall Goliath, Samson smashes towering columns and Jonah's whale has a tail that flips across two full pages. This memorable volume is told and done in a clever way to introduce these key Old Testament stories.

### **Other**

George, Elizabeth. *A Girl's Guide to Making Really Good Choices*. This book uses a girl as the main character and follows through with a variety of choices, some good and some bad. There are Scripture readings to answer questions. Each chapter deals with a different choice as well as how God would want them to handle it. It teaches the girls to spend time daily with the Lord, praying, reading the Bible, obeying, choosing good friends, and many more. This book can be used as a family devotional or for a middle school girl to read.
