Dear Old First friends:

May 25 marks the last day of my internship with you all. I wanted to pause a moment and say with deep sincerity, “thank you.”

It’s been quite a ride for me. Some things changed and some things didn’t. I’ll start with the latter. In September of 2013 you welcomed me into your community with such warmth and support. I remember the first day that I met Maggi; she took me to lunch at *Ti Piacerà*—yummy. The following week I met with a few session members. We ate much simpler homemade soup made from SF Food Bank vegetables, and bread left over from the Saturday meal. I now have an understanding what that second experience was about. Old First tries to use local, excess resources to serve its community. Our world needs more of that kind of attitude and ministry. Then I met the entire congregation. I believe it was at my first Sunday service at Old First that I blundered through my liturgical role, which was embarrassing, but most of you didn’t blink an eye. I’m still blundering from time to time, but they’re important moments to me because they’re evidence that I get to end my internship with the same sense of warmth, acceptance, and support that I received when I got here. It’s a tremendous blessing!

What changed? Some of you know that I chose a church internship for the very fact that I wanted to avoid it. Maybe that’s strange to hear from a burgeoning minister, but it’s true. My ministry was originally formed around hospital chaplaincy, not parish ministry. Because I experienced myself as a hospital chaplain, I had a good excuse to avoid preaching, teaching, or leading liturgical practice. But gratefully, I had a sense that any form of Presbyterian ministry wouldn’t work if I couldn’t find an identity within the church, as well. That’s been the single most significant change for me here. I discovered a parish identity. I feel such joy when I get in touch with that fact. Another great blessing! Again, thank you to all of you. I wish you all the best in the coming years, and hope we will maintain some level of connection in future.

WELCOMING NEW MEMBERS

On Palm Sunday, Old First Presbyterian Church joyfully received three new members, all of whom joined by Reaffirmation of Faith.



Dick Meimban, born in Manila, immigrated to San Francisco last spring. He and his mother Lolita Ramos (who sometimes accompanies him to Old First) live near the church. Dick became a Christian in 1983 and for ten years focused on street ministry in Manila. In the 1990s he went to Vietnam as a teacher of English. He currently teaches computer use to seniors as part of SF Senior and Disability Action. He helped cook the April Community Dinner.

Eder and Angela Duenas were raised as Roman Catholics in Bogota, Colombia. Eder began attending Old First at the invitation of his Diamond Heights neighbor Bob Fleming. A doctor in Colombia, Eder now practices as a massage therapist (“Magic Hands Massage”). He and Angela maintained a long-distance telephone romance for many months before Angela immigrated earlier this year. Pastor Maggi officiated at their wedding at Old First on Valentine’s Day. After working in business and accounting in Colombia, Angela is now focusing on learning English.



PAM BYERS NAMED 2014 SFTS DISTINGUISHED ALUMNA

Pamela Byers, a ruling elder at Old First Presbyterian Church in San Francisco, has been named San Francisco Theological Seminary’s 2014 Distinguished Alumna for her work removing a ban on the ordination of gay and lesbian Presbyterians. Byers earned a master’s degree in theological studies over a 10-year period while working as executive director of Covenant Network of Presbyterians.

When Byers helped to found that organization in 1997, she thought it might take 10 months to change the policy that excluded gays and lesbians from ordination as ministers, elders, or deacons in the Presbyterian Church (USA). “It was such an obvious reform, but it took 14 years,” says Byers, 66, who describes taking the job as a call. “Still, it was very satisfying to see that goal achieved on my watch.”

Byers, who already had a PhD when she enrolled at SFTS, says she entered the seminary master’s program because “the opportunity for lay people to get a serious theological education is a real luxury.” She adds, “It helped a great deal with my work, being better able to understand and frame theological and biblical arguments and also to understand church history.”

Jerry Van Marter, a distinguished SFTS alumnus and director of the Presbyterian News Service of the Presbyterian Church (USA), served on the Alumni Council’s nominating committee that chose to honor Byers. “What the committee found compelling,” he says, “is that Pamela built Covenant Network into one of the most effective and inclusive organizations in the entire church – and those values really embody what SFTS is all about.”

On a personal note, Van Marter added, “I was thrilled when Pamela’s name bubbled to the top. She is a seminary graduate who has chosen to live out a Christian vocation as a lay person rather than a minister, and she is well known and much loved in the Presbyterian Church for her perseverance.”

SERVING OUR NEIGHBORS THROUGH COMMUNITY DINNERS

For more than fifteen years, Old First has welcomed homeless and marginally housed neighbors at twice-a-month dinners at Old First. For most of those years, the dinners were organized by *Welcome!* formerly known as the Homeless Ministry.

Late last year, *Welcome!* redefined its focus and moved away from serving meals. The session believed that offering hospitality in this form is a core part of our ministry and witness to the city. The session agreed to undertake responsibility for continuing a monthly dinner, at least for six months – now extended to twelve months. A Project Team including Gabriele Beck-Engeser, Michael Berg, Pam Byers, Betsy Chiao, Bill Feister and Maggi Henderson has overseen the monthly meals while working toward a long-term plan.

At least for 2014, Old First is serving a full, home-cooked dinner to 150 – 175 homeless or marginally housed neighbors on the fourth Saturday of every month. Nearby St Paulus Lutheran Church and Trinity+St Peter's Episcopal Church are currently helping to provide meals, and we anticipate inviting other Presbyterian churches in the City to participate in the fall.

Each month we need 15–20 volunteers, in addition to the cooks. Volunteers come from 4:30 to 7 p.m. to set the tables, serve our guests, offer hospitality and conversation, and clean up. You can sign up during coffee hour the two Sundays before each dinner, or by writing to saturdaymeals@oldfirst.org. Or ask Pam Byers (pambyers.sf@gmail.com) to put you on the regular list to be invited each month.

If you have questions or suggestions, please talk with any of the Project Team members. Or better still, come and volunteer one Saturday. Most people who've done it once find it so rewarding that they keep returning. Come and see for yourself!

Christian Education, May 11 and 18

The Christian Education Committee will hold a two-session program *TRIGGER: The Ripple Effect of Gun Violence* on two Sundays, May 11 and 18, at 9:30 am. in the Munro Room. Please invite your friends and neighbors to attend this important program.

Every day we see story after story on death and injury from gun violence. Every year there are 31,000 deaths due to gun violence, including 19,000 suicides. The debate on gun control and Second Amendment rights continues and there is no progress toward a solution. Take the time to engage in discussion to explore the question "What can we do to prevent gun violence?" and consider next steps for action.

The program features a documentary, produced by the Presbyterian Peacemaking Program, which shares the story of how gun violence impacts individuals and communities and examines the "ripple effect" that one shooting has on a survivor, a family, a community and society. Andrea Segura Smith will facilitate the program.

Old First Art and Architecture Tour, May 11, 18, 25

As Old First celebrates its 165th anniversary, it is appropriate to acknowledge the tangible reminders of our heritage, including our worship space and its adornment. Our building, in the Byzantine/Romanesque style, was completed 102 years ago and, in subsequent years it has been adorned with stained glass, ceiling stenciling and works of art that contribute to the worship of God in that space.

Jamieson Prevoznak on Western Esoteric Traditions, May 25

The Christian Education Committee will host Jamieson Prevoznak, a student at San Francisco Theological Seminary on Sunday, May 25, at 9:30 am in the Munro Room.

Jamieson is in the third year of the master of divinity program at the seminary. He hopes to pursue ordination through the Presbyterian Church (USA) to become a chaplain in the United States Navy where now he is currently serving as an ensign and a chaplain candidate. He already has over ten years in the military. He is a member of St. John's Presbyterian Church in San Francisco and currently serves as intern at San Geronimo Community Presbyterian Church in West Marin.

Jamieson will speak on Western esoteric tradition, their foundational period in ancient Egypt and Greece, the document known as the "Hermetica," and its principle character/author Hermes Trismegistus.

This class will view the long history of Western esoteric traditions from their origins in ancient Egypt and Greece, through their early modern and high modern foundations in the Renaissance and Enlightenment, and into the contemporary traditions and new religious movements. This class will be conducted from both academic/educational and practitioner/believer points of view.
