### Worship Committee Art Project for World Communion Sunday

This summer the worship committee has been working on some art projects to help us interpret World Communion for our worship this October 2. One of our inspirations comes from Lamentations 1: 1-6, a lectionary reading of the day. This really expresses a deep sorrow felt by many for the world's sufferings.

We also want to show God's sovereignty and the worlds' desired unity. The symbols we selected to carry out these themes include a globe, tears, praying hands and open hands. Several artists are preparing pieces with these themes. Cindy Burt, who has sewn many expressive banners in the past, is making a wall hanging and altar cloth. New to us, Kurt Schwartzman is working on a couple of possibilities, a reredos painting or something to be hung from the ceiling.

### Peace and Global Witness Offering

This month, congregations throughout the Presbyterian Church (USA) will receive the annual Peace and Global Witness Offering. This offering works both locally around the world to transform cultures of violence into communities of peace.

Fifty percent of the offering funds the PC(USA)'s Presbyterian Peacemaking Program, which advocates for active, nonviolent solutions to conflict, supports international peacemakers and holds conferences. For example, the PC(USA) is working to spread God's peace and grace in the Democratic Republic of the Congo and to address attitudes of racism and violence and prevention of gun violence in the U.S.

Since peace begins in our homes and communities, 25% of the offering will be used by Old First for local peacemaking. This year, our Mission Committee decided unanimously to donate Old First's share of the offering to the International Rescue Committee, whose Oakland office resettles approximately 75 families, or 450 refugees, per year in Bay Area communities.

Our San Francisco Presbytery will use the remaining 25% of the offering to support local peacemaking efforts. One of these is the Sojourner Truth Presbyterian Church Peace Camp, in the City of Richmond. The Peace Camp provides tools to enable children to find peace within themselves, their families and the community. Christian educators provide Richmond children resources such as prayer, mediation, art, storytelling, writing, teambuilding and knowledge of peacemakers through history.

Old First's Peace and Global Witness Offering will be on World Communion Sunday, October 2. Our generosity will help further God's peace and grace in local neighborhoods and in areas of unrest, violence and discord around the world. –Bill Campbell

#### **Being Church in the Digital Age: Connecting with Connected People**

How does the church connect with a world that is connected to and through their phones? The internet, mobile devices and social media are central means by which people are developing relationships. Can Christians develop the tools to reach this population, which includes our very own children? Over these few days we will look at how we as Christians can better live out our calling in this changed and changing world. Our individual and corporate ability to harness the power of social connectivity is key to the future of Christianity. Can we thrive as we engage in this new relational landscape?

Our speaker Ralph Watkins, comes highly recommended by last year's Rodger Nishioka. Ralph is the Peachtree Associate Professor of Evangelism and Church Growth at Columbia Seminary. His work there focuses on building bridges between young adults and the church in order to develop future leaders for the twenty-first century. As a scholar, professional photographer, pastor, television host, filmmaker, and sought after speaker and workshop leader Professor Watkins has over 250 publications and conference presentations to his credit.

We will join with Calvary Presbyterian Church and Burlingame Presbyterian Church. There will be two nights lodging in a beautiful and tranquil setting in the redwoods. ### **“The Muslim Next Door,” Covenant Presbyterian Church, Saturday, October 22**

Old First is co-hosting a special event and discussion with Sumbul Ali-Karamali called "The Muslim Next Door: Know Your Neighbor". Please plan to attend. The event will be taking place on Saturday, October 22, from 1:00 pm to 3:00 pm at Covenant Presbyterian Church, 321 Taraval Street in San Francisco.

Many of us do not personally know any Muslims who can answer questions we have. Ms. Ali-Karamali wrote her book, *The Muslim Next Door: the Qur-an, the Media, and that Veil Thing* to provide academic, cultural and personal information from a reliable source in a warm and relevant context.

She will present and discuss with us the topics that are most confusing, most interesting and most wondered about by Western non-Muslims by using stories, anecdotes, and concrete facts about what Muslims believe, practice, differ, agree, argue about, condemn, and condone.

Sumbul Ali-Karamali is an American Muslim mom and former lawyer who grew up in a suburb of Los Angeles. In addition to her degree in English from Stanford and her law degree from University of California at Davis, she has a degree in Islamic law from the University of School of Oriental and African Studies (SOAS). Through her books, essays, and lectures, she answers questions on Islam and Muslims, both from within her tradition and from an academic perspective. She serves on the board of trustees of a nonprofit educational institution that teaches environmental education to children and youth. She also serves on the steering committee of Women in Islamic Spirituality and Equality (WISE), an initiative dedicated to mobilizing a movement for social justice.

Bring an open mind and join with your neighboring Presbyterians to discover new insights and meet the Muslim next door. Light refreshments will follow the program. —Lori Yamauchi

### **August Meeting Session Report**

Elders had an active meeting on August 23.

- They approved the Senior Center October 1 “Fun Raiser,” and they moved to appoint Bill Campbell and Lori Yamauchi delegates to the September 27 Presbytery Meeting.
- After careful and compassionate discussion it was moved to post a “No Trespassing” sign recommended by the SF Police Department along with an additional sign identifying helpful services and resources for homeless individuals.
- The Mission Committee reported that the We Choose Welcome posters had been placed on bulletin boards in the neighborhood, and announced that the Peace And Global Witness Making Offering will be received on October 2.
- The Operations Committee reported that current projects include installation of the stained glass window in the Columbarium, seismic safety upgrade to the baptismal font and roof inspection to determine cause of blistering in the balcony.
- It was announced that proceeds from the Ice Cream Social will go to the We Choose Welcome effort.
- The Worship Committee reported that distribution of “The Presbyterian Outlook,” notes from the 2016 General Assembly in Portland, will be distributed.
- The Christian Education committee announced An Islam talk at Covenant Presbyterian Church on October 22, the All-Church Retreat on October 15-16, a ballot measures discussion on October 23, and that six youths are participating in confirmation class.

### **Old First Church Columbarium's Original Vision Completed**

That beautiful space just inside the Van Ness entrance is Old First's columbarium. It contains niches for the inurnment of ashes, with plaques to memorialize each life, and also plaques placed in memory of those who are buried, or whose ashes were scattered, elsewhere. All the artwork in the columbarium is part of the permanent art of the church, and complements all other artwork.

The newest piece of art, a stained-glass window featuring a field of lilies, was recently installed in the viewing area above the Columbarium chamber. This window will be dedicated in a brief ceremony to be held immediately following worship on Sunday, October 30. The window completes the original vision of the Columbarium and enhances all the other art in this part of the church. The design for the window was commissioned a decade ago by Steve Taber from David Forte.

The columbarium (not a public facility) is for members and former members, pastors and former pastors, assistants, associates, interims, and parish associates; and staff and former staff members of Old First or its affiliated ministries. The Columbarium Ministry Team members are Tracy Clagett, Bill Feister, Bob Fleming, Linda Reyder, Mary Russell and Steve Taber.
