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Maggi's Musings

The Book of Common Worship – the Presbyterian Church (USA)'s wonderful liturgical resource – reminds us that on the Day of Pentecost (Acts 2:1-13), God gave us the gift of the Holy Spirit to empower us as witnesses to the resurrection. This year Pentecost falls on May 20.

When Jesus' followers were together together fifty days after his resurrection, sounds from heaven, cosmic language, the rush of a mighty pnoē (wind, breath) invaded the house in which the apostles had gathered. Tongues of fire glowed on each of them and they were filled with holy pneuma (wind, breath, spirit). The Hebrew Bible had called God's unseen action God's rnach (the wind, breath, spirit), and the early Greek-speaking Christians did likewise. This unseen power of God moved among them and gripped them. This "unseenness" is God's Holy Spirit working in and among us even today. (See John 3:8.)

According to the prophet Joel (2:28-29) God's *ruach* will turn everybody toward God's future. People young and old will dream and will have visions of hope; they will be able to free themselves from hide-bound ways, because God will establish a whole new economy of creation. The Holy Spirit breaks us out of our preoccupation with ourselves and frees us to serve neighbors, loosens our grasp on possessions, and sets us to loving people. New creation is what Joel is talking about. Pentecost is new creation.

The book of Acts tells the story of the outcome of Pentecost's new creation: People witness in word and in deed to the risen Christ. At the outset, the newborn church immediately tumbled out into the streets to witness to God's mighty works in the languages of people all over the world. By the end of the story, a tiny, Spirit-filled community of faith that broke from the present order has spread across the continents with incredible power to bring new things into being. With the gift of the Spirit, all things are possible.

Therefore, on the Day of Pentecost, we celebrate God's gift of Holy Spirit which draws us together as one people, helps us to comprehend what God is doing in the world, and empowers us to proclaim, in word and in deed, God's plan of reconciling all people in the name of Christ (Ephesians 1:10).

Without the gift of the Spirit, Christ's church dries up and withers away, and we are left with only our broken selves. With the gift of the Spirit, all things are possible. A spirit-filled community of faith opens eyes to needs, hopes and concerns in the world and sees its mission as God's new people active in the world.

The Day of Pentecost is the climax of the Great Fifty Days of Eastertide, celebrating as it does the gift of the Spirit to the body of Christ — the church. We will celebrate Pentecost at Old First with installation of elders to serve on Session and of deacons to serve on the Board of Deacons. As we install these elders and deacons, we will ask the Spirit to be present in them that they may discern God's call to us and God's creative Spirit ever-ready within us.

As part of our celebration of the gift of the Holy Spirit we will gather our Pentecost Offering and also enjoy a Founders Day/Old First Birthday potluck lunch after worship.

May God's Spirit blow fresh life into our church – into us – on Pentecost and every day! Peace, Maggi

Pentecost Offering 2018, May 20

O God, from my youth you have taught me, and I still proclaim your wondrous deeds. —Psalm 71:17

The Pentecost Offering unites us in a churchwide effort to support young people in Christ and to inspire them to share their faith, ideas, and unique gifts with the church and the world.

On Pentecost Sunday, May 20, we celebrate the gift of the Holy Spirit and the birthday of the church. The Holy Spirit remains with us still, connecting us with the church of the past, continuing to inspire the church of today, and pointing us to the church of the future.

Studies show that a foundation of faith established during childhood through young adulthood, helps ensure lifelong faith and service. Psalm 71 testifies to this same truth. Verse 17 says "O God, from my youth you have taught me, and I still proclaim your wondrous deeds." The patterns and lessons established during these formative years continue to bear fruit throughout a person's life.

These lessons might be taught through a congregation's commitment to **Educate a Child, Transform the World in** ministries that shape a child's academic achievement, setting them on a path toward a stable future. They might be taught through one of the youth events sponsored by **Ministries with Youth** at the national church that brings together young people from all over the country to share their experiences of faith with one another and learn how their faith can help them address challenges all over the world. Or they might be taught through a year of intentional service where they discern God's call upon their lives by our **Young Adult Volunteer Program.**

And there is more: Presbyterian congregations are finding new ways to minister to children at risk in their own communities. General Assembly programs are advocating for children and developing youth and young adult leaders.

By giving to the Pentecost Offering, one of the four Special Offerings of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.), we are nurturing the faith of those who are the church to come; children, youth, and young adults. We invite your congregation to join with the worldwide church in building for our future, in building individual lives of faith. Won't you join us? If we all do a little, it adds up to a lot.

At Old First Presbyterian we will be giving our 40% of our offering to **The Ecumenical House**, the **San Francisco Campus Christian Center** at San Francisco State University. This is a powerful campus ministry that Old First supports with our mission-giving. Our own Erwin Barron is even on their board.

In June, Old First will have a gift card drive as we observe World Refugee Week. Many recently-arrived refugee families live in poverty, and gift cards put money in their pockets. After years of being denied freedom of choice, they can shop for themselves and buy what they need. Gift cards also help them learn how to shop and to become educated consumers.

According to refugees that the International Rescue Committee's Oakland office serves, retailers that are especially useful to them are Target, Food Maxx and Safeway. The IRC suggests \$25 or \$50 cards.

To support our World Refugee Week gift card drive, you can contribute gift cards or money to buy them, whichever works better for you. If you would like to have a record of your contribution for tax purposes, you will need to write a check to Old First. Either way, Old First will match your contribution to double your impact up to an overall total of \$2,000!

Giving Thanks for 55 years of Ministry with the Seniors of San Francisco Old First's Doris Kraus Senior Center Closes May 7, 2018

The story is told that in 1963, San Francisco Mayor George Christopher asked the San Francisco Council of Churches to offer a lunch program to seniors. Old First Presbyterian Church said yes to the challenge and would go on to serve seniors faithfully for the next fifty-five years. Doris Krauss, Old First's Director of Christian Education in 1963, also became the director of the new program for seniors and continued in that role for twenty-two years. For almost forty years the center was fully staffed by volunteers.

Five years ago, Old First's session formed the Doris Krauss Senior Center Commission to take a long-term view of the center. The commission of Randy Smith, Betty Voris, Cindy Burt, Sally Spencer, and recent member Kristi Hoerauf brought renewed energy, focus, commitment, and set goals and objectives for the senior center. They have wrestled with funding, limited day-time volunteers, and explored whether the center could bring in more seniors and offer other programs to address unmet needs among San Francisco's seniors.

After much reflection, time, and work the commission proposed to the church session that – after more than half a century – the senior center close its doors. The session reflected on this wisdom and with heavy hearts decided that the Doris Krauss Senior Center had served the city and our seniors long and well. They reflected how fifty-five years ago there were far too few senior centers and now there are over twenty-five city and non-profit centers serving meals and meeting the needs of seniors all over San Francisco.

Old First elder John Kramer spoke a word of hope to the session's heavy heart saying, "In some ways this a triumph-55 years ago this church and others met a need in the city. They were pioneers in caring for Seniors and now a half a century later the city and civic organizations have arisen to meet the needs of seniors in San Francisco. In 1963 Old First was ahead of the curve and now others have stepped into care in ways we could have never imagined!"

Pastor Maggi Henderson reflected that this is now the time for us to pray, to listen, to experiment, and to seek out where God is calling us serve, where we should be the compassion of Christ in 2018 and beyond.

There will be a final catered lunch for seniors on May 7, when we will remember and give thanks for all the meals and fellowship that have been enjoyed around our tables so many Mondays over fifty-five years. Everyone that has a connection with the Doris Krauss Senior Center is invited to join us for this meal at 12:00 noon.
