Maggi's Musings

Even though I flunked statistics in college my first time out, I have always been interested in research and data. I know to take it with a grain of salt and also that numbers/reports don't give answers as much as they offer a window for reflection, an opportunity to look at views outside of my own place in the world and can open me up to new ideas.

I have often been interested in what Barna Group of Ventura, California, puts out. Barna has been "conducting and analyzing primary research to understanding culture trends related to values, beliefs and attitudes and behaviors since 1984." (You can do internet search and get postings from them at no cost.) They often have intriguing reports on the life of faith and particularly the church.



This week an E-mail article came across my desk with the headline "The Most Post-Christian Cities in America: 2017." I eagerly clicked to learn more and discovered that San Francisco is number 8!

The report begins: It may come as no surprise that the influence of Christianity in the United States is waning. Rates of church attendance, religious affiliation, belief in God, prayer and Bible-reading have all been dropping for decades. By consequence, the role of religion in public life has been slowly diminishing, and the church no longer functions with the cultural authority it held in times past. These are unique days for the church in America as it learns what it means to flourish in a new "Post-Christian" era.

You may well ask what is a post Christian? Barna used assent to nine or more of the following statements to define "post-Christian" persons:

- Do not believe in God
- Identify as atheist or agnostic
- Disagree that faith is important in their lives
- Have not prayed to God (in the last week)
- Have never made a commitment to Jesus
- Disagree the Bible is accurate
- Have not donated money to a church (in the last year)
- Have not attended a Christian church (in the last 6 months)

- Agree that Jesus committed sins
- Do not feel a responsibility to "share their faith"
- Have not read the Bible (in the last week)
- Have not volunteered at church (in the last week)
- Have not attended Sunday school (in the last week)
- Have not attended religious small group (in the last week)

- Bible engagement scale: low (have not read the Bible in the past week and disagree strongly or somewhat that the Bible is accurate)
- Not Born Again

I suspect many of you were not surprised to find out where we are on the list. We have been living this reality for years. It is one of the reasons I feel amazed and blessed when visitors come to worship: It is a truly *countercultural* act. It also makes me thankful for you who are part of this church community. You are truly *exceptional*.

These statics don't make me feel like giving up, for I feel people still have a spiritual hunger, a longing for community, a desire to find a way to live that offers peace, hope, wholeness, challenge and guidance on how to live as loving, fully engaged people. And the world certainly still needs people to actively love it.

I think the way of Jesus addresses those desires and longings and offers a way to live not just for myself but for others. The church, people of faith witness and presence may be needed more than ever before.

May God give us wisdom, joy, and an adventurous spirit for the living of these days.

Prepare Ye The Way of The Lord! "How to Be a Better Liturgist," October 14 and 21

As I've been thinking about this *Shared Life* article, I keep singing that refrain from the 1973 *Godspell* production, "Prepare ye the way of the Lord." In this production, a clear tenor voice sings out this refrain over the city, and people drop what they are doing and gather in a large park – that tenor voice has gotten their attention... I realize that I'm showing my age when I use that reference – but that's what a good liturgist can do – a good liturgist gets our attention, calls us together, inspires and moves us to worship, to reflection, to understanding.

God's Creation, Our Home: Our Compostables Policy at Old First

At Old First Presbyterian Church our policy for using only compostable dishes and flatware rather than single-use "disposable" plastics is part of our good stewardship of God's creation, our home.

Old First has plenty of compostable plates, bowls, and cups as well as compostable flatware – knives, forks, and spoons – for all church events. They are all made out compostable materials, such as paper or cornstarch. Thus they are not only easy on creation, but also make clean-up a breeze, because all compostable materials, including leftover food, can go right into the green compostable barrel.

Some of these dishes and flatware are on hand in the "supply cupboard" in the Sacramento Street Lobby. And you can find large supplies of them in the lower basement, off the Nursery, where we also keep cleaning supplies and household tools. (Use the door to the right of the fire place.)

On Sundays our Sunday sexton, Javier González, can unlock doors for access to these materials; during the week our office admin, Brad Peterson can.
