World Communion Sunday with Guest Preacher Glenda Hope, October 6

The Reverend Glenda Hope, long-time friend of Old First, will join us to preach and preside at communion on World Communion Sunday, October 6. For over three-quarters of a century, Christians of many denominations have celebrated communion on the first Sunday of October to affirm a vision of ecumenical unity despite our present divisions. According to Presbyterian Outlook:

Davitt S. Bell (the late Clerk of Session and church historian at Shadyside Presbyterian Church, Pittsburgh, PA]) recalled that Dr. [Hugh Thomson] Kerr [minister of Shadyside] first conceived the notion of World Communion Sunday during his year as moderator of the General Assembly (1930). Dr. Kerr's younger son, the Rev. Dr. Donald Craig Kerr, who is pastor emeritus of the Roland Park Presbyterian Church in Baltimore, was sixteen in 1933. He has related that World Communion Sunday grew out of the Division of Stewardship at Shadyside. It was their attempt to bring churches together in a service of Christian unity—in which everyone might receive both inspiration and information, and above all, to know how important the Church of Jesus Christ is, and how each congregation is interconnected one with another.

The speaker is Don Baird, who just happens to be the father of BurlPres's senior pastor, Graham Baird, who preached at Old First on August 4. Don's topic is **Where the Journey Begins: Traveling with Paul and Barnabas through the Holy Land.** Don has served as pastor in Sacramento, Salt Lake City, and Boise, Idaho. He received his Doctor of Ministry from San

Francisco Theological Seminary (San Anselmo, California). He was born and raised in Stockton and comes from a family with a long tradition of Presbyterian ministers.

News from Pricilla and George Yu

Dear Friends of Old First,

It's been around seven weeks since we left OFPC and have semi-settled into Longwood at Oakmont, Verona, PA. We have moved here to be near our son and his family who live half an hour away from us in Murrysville, PA. Oakmont/Verona and Murrysville are all suburbs of Pittsburgh.

Longwood at Oakmont is an affiliate of Presbyterian Senior-Care with over 400 residences, not all necessarily retired. There are several categories of accommodations, Garden Apartments, Country

Homes and Apartments of various varieties in different sections of Longwood. We call this community a campus.

Longwood has many activities you may participate in including exercise classes, water aerobics, Tai Chi, card games, mahjong, line dancing, ping pong, yoga, etc., etc. There also are lectures from visiting university professors, musical events, state legislators coming to speak, movies, and so on.

The 60-acre campus is beautiful with rolling hills, flowers and greenery all over. We live in the Woodlands Apartment section — a 2-bedroom apartment similar to the one we lived in SF. However, our living room has a gorgeous view, overlooking a forest of tall green trees and rolling hills. The food served is of high quality, nothing that we could ever attempt to prepare.

We have discovered the Pittsburgh area is abounding in Presbyterian churches.

In our immediate district we seem to feel at home at Fox Chapel Presbyterian Church, a short distant from where we live. For the first time, this past Sunday, we heard the choir sing. It was lovely. Our thanks go to Larry Marietta's suggestion - who was formerly Director of Music at Fox Chapel - to visit the church and see how we would like it. Fox Chapel has two services at 10 am: traditional worship in the sanctuary and, downstairs, contemporary worship. The majority who worship downstairs are the millennials and families with young children.

We met the minister briefly just before he took a one month hiking holidays in Europe. The church is lovely, built in the 1960's, and designed in a rather modern motif in my eyes.

The atrium where you congregate before and after the service for coffee and juice is airy, giving the appearance of openness with glass ceilings to shield you from the hot summers and cold winters. Like all churches, their membership has gone down. It was noted in the past they were two thousand strong but now down to between 400-500 members!?

BTW in our Longwood complex there is a chaplain who has weekly Sunday worship services.

I think of Old First often and truly miss you all. I miss Maggi, the dear friends of Old First, the choir and serving at Old First.

Report from Brad Peterson on Teaching at SFTS

A weekly routine has now settled. Instead of working my morning half-day on Fridays, I now work a whole day on Friday and work only the morning on Tuesdays. Each Tuesday, at 12:27 pm promptly, I catch Golden Gate Transit Bus 101 on Van Ness Avenue at Clay Street. After changing buses in San Rafael I arrive in San Anselmo at 1:23 pm and then walk or ride my bike to San Francisco Theological Seminary (SFTS) perched on the hill in San Anselmo.

The class is small – two students from the Presbyterian Church (USA) and one from the Disciples of Christ. However, our time together allows for real involvement with the history of Christianity and how it is different or similar to our own faith journeys and practices today.

Though SFTS is now embedded in the University of Redlands as its Graduate School of Theology and new flags and signs have gone up around the campus, the experience for me is all delight and nostalgia. This semester I teach in a room just across the hall from where I was first a teaching assistant during doctoral studies with my adviser, Chris Ocker, then the professor for church history at SFTS.
