# SHARING GOD'S LOVE, WELCOME, AND JUSTICE ON OUR CORNER, IN OUR CITY, AND IN THE WORLD

Thanks go to all the folks who met, shared and shaped this statement of who we are and what we are about. It will be in our bulletin, on the website, and hopefully in our minds and hearts. Our next step will be exploring, discovering, and visioning how we will live this out - imagining who God longs for us to be, and how we will show forth God's love, welcome and justice.

One of the ways we are living into this statement is by generously sharing our space in our building. So much goes on at Old First during the week: the Fellowship Hall, Munro Room and kitchen are regularly used for the Friendship Banquet, a weekly meal for limited income folks living with HIV/AIDS; weekly and monthly AA meetings; Larkin Street Youth Services training for new employees; an infant/mother play group in the nursery; and high school and college youth groups sleeping on our floors during mission trips – including the Illini4000 from the University of Illinois who raise funds for cancer research by riding their bikes all the way from the East Coast to San Francisco each summer!

The sanctuary, particularly, is regularly used for all sorts of rehearsals, recordings, lessons, concerts and visits. Musicians often tell me how thankful they are for the space, how wonderful the sound is and how they feel the holy in this space. At various times Brad or I will open up the sanctuary to give a quick tour to visitors from all over the US and the world. We also welcome people who only seek the peace of the sanctuary to pray.

More recently, we have made the office off the Munro room to the Faithful Fools as a respite from the business of working in the heart of the Tenderloin. (Read more about the Faithful Fools' use of our building in the article on page 2.)

Partnering with others and using our space as a means of welcome and of furthering God's justice and love in the world is in our very DNA. Old First continues to make a difference in our community by sharing our building and location.

Please note that I will be gone three Sundays starting September 22 as a faculty member leading the pilgrimage in France called "Portals to the Sacred" and afterwards enjoying some vacation time. # Peace and Global Witness Sunday, Guest Preacher, September 29

What is a Matthew 25 church? Matthew 25:31–46 calls all of us to actively engage in the world around us, so our faith comes alive and we wake up to new possibilities. Convicted by this passage, both the 222nd and 223rd General Assemblies (2016 and 2018) exhorted the PC(USA) to act boldly and compassionately to serve people who are hungry, oppressed, imprisoned or poor. By accepting the Matthew 25 invitation, congregations can help our denomination become a more relevant presence in the world. We recognize Christ's urgent call to be a church of action, where God's love, justice and mercy shine forth and are contagious. And we rejoice how our re-energized faith can unite all Presbyterians for a common and holy purpose: our common identity to do mission.



Old First has invited Peacemaker, the Reverend Arlington Trotman, to preach in worship and to have further conversation with us after worship on Sunday, September 29. He is the former moderator of the Churches' Commission for Migrants in Europe (CCME), an organization of churches and ecumenical councils from eighteen European countries that advocates for migrants, refugees and minority groups. He also served as the former CEO of the Churches' Commission for Racial Justice at Churches Together in Britain and Ireland (CTBI). He is an ordained minister with the Methodist Church in Britain serving in a variety of capacities. He previously served as managing director of AW Trotman Associates doing work on anti-racism

and discrimination as well as equality policy and practice promoting good community relations in church and society. He is an experienced trainer and conference speaker on a variety of topics including professional and personal mentoring and human rights. He has authored a number of publications and books including *Beneath the Surface, Hurricane Katrina, Fact Finding Addressing Racism in the Southern States; Sanctuary, Guidelines for Church and Society Offering Asylum Protection;* and Redeeming the *Time, All God's People Must Challenge Racism.*

# Save the Date: Retreat at Mt Hermon, October 18-20, 2019

The date for the fabulous church retreat weekend is from dinner on Friday, October 18, through lunch on Sunday, October 20. It will be held at Mt Hermon Conference Center and we will once again join "BurlPres," aka First Presbyterian Church of Burlingame. This year Lafayette Orinda Presbyterian Church will also be a part of the usual stimulating sessions, spiritual enrichment and plenty of fun and games.

The pricing is the same as last year: \$350 for deluxe, \$300 for standard and \$250 for economy. These are double occupancy per person.



The speaker is Don Baird, who just happens to be the father of BurlPres's senior pastor, Graham Baird, who preached at Old First on August 4. Don's topic is **Where the Journey Begins: Traveling with Paul and Barnabas through the Holy Land.** Don has served as pastor in Sacramento, Salt Lake City, and Boise, Idaho. He received his Doctor of Ministry from San Francisco Theological Seminary (San Anselmo, California). He was born and raised in Stockton and comes from a family with a long tradition of Presbyterian ministers.

Mt Hermon is nestled among the towering redwoods of the Santa Cruz Mountains just six miles from Monterey Bay. It has sunny fields, redwood trees, quiet walks and hiking trails, and zip lines. The food is exceptional and the fellowship with other churches is priceless! Our retreats at Mt Hermon offer a great balance of learning, fellowship, worship and free time.

#### Thanks Go to Old First for Supporting International Rescue Committee's Work

Thanks to everyone who contributed items and funding that allowed us to fill four travel bags with comfort items for asylum-seeking families! You raised \$5,102.! Funds, above what was needed to buy and fill the bags on August 18, will be contributed to the International Rescue Committee (IRC) to make up more travel bags.

The bags we assembled have been shipped to the IRC in Phoenix for distribution to people who will travel by bus to their sponsors in the U.S. Each bag contained a variety of useful items for an adult and a child – inflatable pillows, blankets, water bottles, bandages, wet wipes, energy bars, a selection of children's games and activities such as coloring book, crayons, pad of paper, play figurines, small stuffed animal, mini Etch-a-sketch, puzzles, etc. Also included was a greeting card welcoming the travelers and wishing them well on their journey. We also sent Visa gift cards separately to the IRC for their distribution to the travelers.

In addition to contributions from Old Firsters, we sincerely thank members of First Presbyterian Church of Alameda, Noe Valley Ministry and Seventh Avenue Presbyterian for their incredible generosity in helping us provide funds and gift cards to so many newly-arrived immigrants who hope to find a better, safer life in the United States!

### Session Meeting Report for June 18 and August 20

Session met on June 18 and August 20, 2019. Highlights of the meetings follow:

- Elders were commissioned to attend the next Presbytery meeting on August 27 in Hayward.
- There was a report from the Strategy Working Group on the discussion of the planning framework about practical actions, updates to the mission statement and vision statement, True North pillars, SMART goals and how to serve the neighborhood and beyond.
- The Worship Committee mentioned that there was a work day in the sanctuary for Pentecost.
- The Community Building Committee continues to work on the church website and a current offline version will be reviewed before going live this Fall. The Committee also mentioned that visitor cards and the process of reaching out to worship visitors was being reviewed and enhanced. In addition, plans for pot luck meals during the next year were being formulated.
- There was a report from Pastor Henderson on the discussions in the development of a Mission statement. All those present agreed by consensus on the following new Mission Statement: Sharing God's love, welcome and justice on our corner, in our city and the world.
- The Christian Education Committee reminded elders about the upcoming exhibit "Then They Came for Me: Visit to an Exhibit on Japanese American Incarceration" on August 25 located at the "Futures Without Violence" building at 100 Montgomery Street in the Presidio.
- It was noted that the back-pack project supported by the Mission Committee was a success, and that under the Operations Committee social hall lighting was being upgraded.
- The Finance Committee reported for the most part income and expenses are fine.

For my patients:

To everything there is a season, and a time to every purpose... a time to toil and a time to refrain from toiling. After practicing medicine for sixty-four years (at age 90) it is my time to refrain from toiling. So, with some sadness, I will be closing the office as of August 15, 2019. A life chapter closes.

Healing the body (soma) as a surgeon and healing the soul (psyche) as a psychiatrist has been a passion, even as I understand that each patient must heal herself/himself/themselves both in body and in mind. For each person who has trusted me with soma and psyche I am deeply grateful.

Going forward there are options. Some may want a respite at this chapter closing.

Most medications can be prescribed by a primary care physician (who could also suggest physicians for continued psychiatric care.) I remain available, at your request, to speak with your physician or psychiatrist for continuity. Best to contact me via email: sfbonedoc@mac.com.

My plans for the future include more time with family, making music, doing photography, reading, travel and attention to maintaining aerobic and musculoskeletal fitness. I may do some volunteer work. Giving is essential to life fulfillment. So, as your new chapter begins, my heartfelt thanks, good wishes and be well.

# Change in Brad Peterson's Hours in Old First Office Begins September

#### Mary Russell, Deacon (Class of 2021)

I've been a member of Old First for about 35 years, and through that time I've served as both a Deacon and an Elder. I was born and raised Presbyterian, and learned from my parents' example what it means to respond to the call to serve our members, friends, and the wider community, and what it has meant to my personal growth in faith. My beliefs have been strengthened and deepened over a lifetime. In my life, I'm grateful for the blessings of my family, and friends especially at Old First.

I believe in the Holy Trinity – Father, Son and Holy Spirit; the amazing breadth and power of the meaning of Three in One – All present at the beginning of time.

I believe in the teachings of the Bible and that we need them to guide our lives.

I believe that some of those teachings are of their time and we are free to not adhere to those – among them, that we do not stone people we as human beings have no right to judge, that we do not own other human beings, that women are not required to keep silent in worship.

I'm inspired by Psalm 51, especially these verses in this Lenten season. I keep a printout of the whole chapter on my nightstand to remind me of what God desires for my life:

Create in me a clean heart, O God, and put a new and right spirit within me.

Restore to me the joy of your salvation, and sustain in me a willing spirit. O Lord, open my lips, and my mouth will declare your praise.

# David Griffith, Deacon (Class of 2022)
