Want to practice your faith every day? Try "D365" (https://d365.org)! D365 is a daily devotional app that you can upload on your phone, iPad or laptop, and look at every day just like you look at your email or social media. And it's free!

What do you see on D365? Each day, D365 presents a devotion which includes five brief pages focused on a theme for the day. The five pages are Pause, Listen, Think, Pray and Go.

How do you access D365? If you go to the App Store on your iPhone or to Googleplay on your Android device or the D365 website, you can get D365 Daily Devotionals for free and open it on your device. Don't confuse this app with the Microsoft Dynamics 365 app for business solutions, which

requires a paid subscription. Deepening your faith takes practice, and there's nothing like an easy app to practice your spiritual exercises!

Planning for Old First's Future Update

Following on the past three years of reflection and assessment, Old First is engaged in a strategic planning process, which began in April. A small task force of elders is working with Pastor Maggi on developing a strategic plan for the next three to five years that is intended to advance Old First's mission and vision, and increase its energy, morale, vitality and capacity toward a unified direction. The planning process started with a mission statement and vision statement. A new mission statement was developed over the summer (see below), and themes from discussions held in November such as cherishing the past and present, reimagining the church, appealing to those seeking ethical/moral guidance, and reaching out, will inform the vision statement (see below). Once the Vision Statement is complete, the plan will identify the "true North" pillars or the primary ways to execute the vision such as worship, people, resources and partnerships. Then, the plan will identify the "adaptive challenges", or forces internal and external to the church which Old First must face in order to realize its vision. These adaptive challenges may require that Old First make "adaptive changes", or changes to the ways that we perceive the world and do the work of the church, in order to meet the adaptive challenges. For example, an adaptive challenge may be that people are not joining organizations anymore. The adaptive change in response to the challenge may be to de-emphasize the concept of membership and emphasize other ways for people to interact with the church.

Once the adaptive changes are identified, then the plan will identify strategic priorities and effective interventions to implement the adaptive changes. An effective intervention may be implemented by carefully designed "experiments", to test new ideas incrementally, and evaluate the results and make adjustments to the intervention before continuing with broader efforts.

The effective interventions will be accompanied by discrete "SMART" (Specific, Measurable, Achievable, Relevant, Time-bound) goals with objectives, metrics, and action plans attached to each goal. Our success in realizing the vision will depend on our follow-through in implementing our action plans. This will require a focused effort on the part of all members and friends. Measuring our progress and celebrating our accomplishments will be critical to our success.

After discussions with the session, deacons, small groups, and other individual members and friends of the congregation about the strategic planning process, Pastor Maggi and the elder task force produced a new mission statement, which was adopted by the session in September. The mission statement, which is printed in the weekly Sunday bulletin, is "Sharing God's Love, Welcome, and Justice On Our Corner, in Our City, and in the World." Hooray for reaching this major milestone!

In November, two brainstorming discussions were held with friends and members to produce ideas about the vision statement. An extensive list of ideas was generated, which the task force will use to produce a new vision statement, for review by the session, deacons, and congregation at large. The ideas build on the mission statement, and will be organized around themes which will populate the vision statement. Themes that emerged from the discussions include: continuing what we cherish, reimagining the church, appealing to those who are looking for ethical/moral guidance or spirituality or community, reaching out to particular groups such as young adults or LGBTQ or retirees, focusing on specific ministries such as healing from burnout or trauma or homeless or refugees or prisoners, and addressing social and political issues such as climate change or racism.

Session Meeting Report for November 2019

Session met on Tuesday, November 26. Below are some highlights from the meeting:

- Pastor Henderson opened the meeting announcing that the Saturday Community Dinner held on November 23 was a success with enough food for all.
- A short Stewardship report indicated that some pledges had been received and that followup was being done.
- It was reported that Strategy and Planning activities gathering input from over thirty-two members of the congregation on Vision ideas had yielded a variety of concepts, many without constraint and varied in nature.
- A short presentation on the PC-USA Imperative for the Reformation in being a Transformative Church in our intercultural era was discussed, and it was noted that Lent activities in 2020 would focus on various Mathew 25 activities and themes.
- It was moved, seconded, and passed unanimously to endorse the grant proposal for Renewal of Ecumenical House Campus Ministry at SFSU.
- It was moved, seconded and passed unanimously to endorse the grant proposal that Old First and Calvary Presbyterian Churches collaborating with Catholic Charities would expand legal and support services to immigrants.
- The Operations Committee reported that an energy audit was required, and that a water leak discovered on the south wall of the sanctuary was being investigated and addressed.
- Christian Education announced that the committee has focused on the Mathew 25 work and engaged the Reverend Leslie Veen, a former seminary intern with us, to lead two workshops scheduled for 2020.
- There was a report from the Community Building Committee that new member classes were scheduled for December 8 and 15, that luncheons for Epiphany and Mardi Gras were planned for January 5 and February 23, and that the church website would be finished in December.
- The Mission Committee mentioned several items including the Mission Fair on December 1, the Larkin Street Youth Services holiday gift drive requesting \$25 gift cards, the Christmas Eve offering which will be split between homeless prenatal programs and the Catholic Charities Immigration Legal and Support Services, the results of the Peace and Global Witness Offering —the 25% local portion going to the Gifford Center to Prevent Gun Violence, and the matching funds for the International Rescue Committee Vision project from seven churches and two individuals.
- The Worship Committee mentioned preparing for Advent with art, decorating the sanctuary and an Advent guide available to anyone who wants it.
- There was a short presbytery report; a highlight was comments on the Mathew 25 work.
